Children collect the eggs from the coup when they have been laid and then they are sold and the money goes towards buying more food and equipment. The chickens have a daily feed of pellets and corn.

Last June Ms Birkett brought in 16 fertilised eggs and put them in an incubator in her classroom and after a few days they began to hatch. It was fantastic and every child in the school saw a chick hatch.
